1) Using Performance Measurement in Resource Allocation John Allen;

Consultant

Linking performance and budget really means using results information in a variety of ways. This interactive workshop uses examples and case studies from government and broader public sector programs to illustrate the concepts presented and to give participants practice at applying the tools for linking results to resources.

2) Empowerment Evaluation: Theory and Advanced Practical Techniques

Paul Favaro &Sumbal Malik; Peel District School Board

The objectives of this workshop are to: a) increase knowledge of empowerment evaluation concepts. procedures, and standards of practice; b) apply this knowledge in handson activities; and c) reflect on the role of empowerment evaluation. Small group work will focus on case-based scenarios and use of a variety of empowerment evaluation tools and procedures.

3) Capabilities of Qualitative Analysis Software

Participants will get a first hand look at the newly released NVivo8 qualitative analysis software. The session will focus on the capabilities of the software including the ways it can bring qualitative and numeric data together. There will also be a focus on dos and don'ts of the software. As a bonus. participants will get a peek at the new way to transcribe or notate audio and video. including coding and searching.

4) Tools for Measuring the Influence of Evaluations Rochelle Zorzi; Cathexis

Cathexis has developed a process and tools to measure the influence of evaluations. The goal is to find out if they are making a difference, and to learn how to make more of a difference. The session will look at the tools. Participants will identify ways they can measure the influence of their evaluations. The group will discuss implications for personal practice and the field of evaluation as a whole.
